## The Durango Arts Center Presents An Installation of Contemporary Indigo Textiles by Award-Winning Artist, Rowland Ricketts

(Durango, CO)—The Durango Arts Center (DAC) presents *work time*, a solo installation of contemporary indigo textiles created by internationally renowned artist Rowland Ricketts, a textile designer and indigo farmer based in Bloomington, IN. The installation, previously exhibited at the Portland Museum of Contemporary Craft in Portland, OR, will layer from the ceiling and encompass the entirety of the Barbara Conrad Gallery. DAC will host an opening reception for the exhibit on Friday, August 12 from 5 to 7pm and a free artist talk with Ricketts on Saturday, August 13 from 5:30-7:30pm in the gallery.

Best known for his bold, graphic designs, Ricketts utilizes natural indigo dyes and centuries-old processes to create dynamic textiles unlike any other fiber artist of his generation. From his indigo farm Ricketts maintains a methodical natural cultivation and dyeing practice; planting, harvesting and drying the indigo entirely by hand. The resulting pieces are not only one-of-a-kind, but also entirely reflective of the time and effort of the historical Japanese art form.

For his exhibit at DAC, *work time*, Ricketts will design a large-scale installation of new works that will layer throughout the floor and ceiling of the Barbara Conrad Gallery, transforming the exhibition space into a unique textile experience. A free lecture on August 13 in the Barbara Conrad Gallery will provide an overview of Rickett's indigo cultivation processes and his artistic process, and the public is highly encouraged to attend. This exhibit is made possible with generous support from Oxford Asset Management and New Face Productions, a volunteer committee dedicated to raising funds for contemporary innovative programming at DAC.

#### **ABOUT ROWLAND RICKETTS**

Trained in indigo farming and dyeing in Japan, Rowland Ricketts received his MFA from Cranbrook Academy of Art in 2005 and is currently an Assistant Professor in Textiles at Indiana University's Henry Radford Hope School of Fine Art. His work has been exhibited at the Textile Museum (Washington, DC), Cavin-Morris Gallery (New York), and Douglas Dawson Gallery (Chicago) and has been published in Textiles Now, FiberArts, Selvedge, Surface Design Journal, and Hand/Eye Magazine. In 2012, Ricketts was awarded a prestigious \$50,000 Friends Fellow Award from United States Artists, signifying recognition as one of America's most accomplished and innovative artists. An excerpt from Rowland Ricketts' artist statement:

"My own experiences with indigo – first as an apprentice in Japan followed by years of working with and learning from this dye – have made me aware of a connection that leads not just from my teachers to me, but one that reaches back to my teacher's teachers and the people they learned from, back into a past in which the processes I use were developed through the accumulated experiences of all who have ever worked with this unique dye."

"I find great value in this connection indigo provides to a greater human tradition. Of equal value to me is the time and energy I invest in the farming, processing, and fermenting of this dye. As a dyer I strive to transfigure all the energy of human endeavor expended on this dye so that its vitality lends its life to and lives on in the dyed cloth."

**FEATURED WORKSHOP** 

In conjunction with this exhibit, DAC will host two adult workshops with Chicago-based textile artist,

Akemi Nakano Cohn. On August 21 from 10am-4pm, Cohn will lead "Shibori with Indigo Dyeing," in

which students will explore various Shibori resist and indigo dyeing techniques. The workshop will be

held at Fort Lewis College's Department of Art & Design at 1000 Rim Drive. On August 22 & 23 from

10am-1pm, Cohn will lead "Beyond the Kimono: Katazome," which is the textile resist-dye process.

This workshop will be held in the Durango Arts Center's Education Studio at 802 E 2nd Avenue.

ABOUT WORKSHOP INSTRUCTOR, AKEMI NAKANO COHN

Born in Yokohama, Japan, Akemi Nakano Cohn studied traditional Japanese dyeing techniques for ten

years under master artist, Haru Izumi. She emigrated to the United States in 1986 and received an

MFA in fiber art at Cranbrook Academy of Art. Cohn has pursued an extensive series of international

exhibitions and commissions, and has been an Artist-in-Residence at Anderson Ranch Art Center and

the Ragdale Foundation.
